



Anne Lamott is a *New York Times* best-selling author of several novels and works of non-fiction who is known for her strong sense of humor and deeply felt insights. Her writings are largely autobiographical, covering subjects such as alcoholism, single motherhood and Christianity. She writes with a strong voice and ruthless honesty on topics such as her left-of-center politics, her unconventional Christian faith and her struggle with schizophrenia. Most of Lamott's writings are about loss, loss of loved ones and loss of personal control, and she manages to tell her stories in an honest, compassionate and pure hearted voice.

Lamott's work includes the novels *Hard Laughter*, *Rosie* and *Crooked Little Heart*, as well as four non-fiction books, including *Bird by Bird*, *Some Instructions on Writing and Life* and *Plan B*; *Further Thoughts on Faith*. She has been honored with a Guggenheim Fellowship and has taught at the University of California at Davis. Lamott's biweekly online diary in *Salon* magazine, *Word by Word*, was voted the "Best of the Web" by *Time* magazine. Lamott's most recent work was an essay collection titled *Grace (Eventually)*; *Thoughts on Faith*.
